He was also pestering her to buy him a stop/slow paddle and advanced warning signs. She asked if there was any way they could stop by our facilities in Bryan one day and take a little tour of the plants. Well, we were happy to oblige!

We arranged a tour with her and Rowan on a Friday afternoon. When they arrived, he could hardly contain his excitement. I have to say that his excitement was very contagious! We first presented him with his own hardhat and safety vest. The

hardhat was labeled with his name and he thought that was the best thing in the world. We drove through the various plants to show him around. He got to push the button to load a truck with hot-mix asphalt and felt so special having loaded a truck and sending it on its way.

We drove to one of our big projects and he got to meet the supervisor, Alan Krenek. Alan was driving a Knife River pickup, which caught Rowan's attention immediately. He said, "I'm riding with Alan in his truck." Coming from Rowan, this was a statement of fact, not a request! We also visited a site where they are digging a pond for a golf course.

After making our way back to the office, we presented him with his own stop/slow paddle, a Knife River T-shirt and safety glasses, and a couple of instructional videos. The stop/slow paddle really threw him into high gear. He just could not believe he got one and the first thing he said was, "Now all I need is the advanced warning signs!" He then proceeded to tell us the exact required dimensions and measurements of a stop/slow paddle. Truly amazing!

It was so rewarding to bring such happiness to this boy. But I have to say that he brought just as much joy and happiness to us as we did to him! It's so easy to get caught up in our
